# **ELKINS COMMON COUNCIL REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**

***401 Davis Avenue  
Council Chamber, 2nd Floor  
January 17, 2019  
7:00 p.m.***

Elkins Common Council met in regular session in the council chamber of city hall. Present were Mayor Van T. Broughton; Councilpersons R.C. Chenoweth, M. D. Cuonzo, C.H. Friddle, III, M.M. Hazen, C. L. Metheny, E.R. Ochsendorf, D.C. Parker, and L.H. Vest; Police Chief G. Galloway; City Treasurer T. Judy; Fire Chief T. W. Meader; Operations Manager R.P. Pingley; City Attorney G. S. Roberts; City Clerk J.R. Sutton (acting as recording secretary); and Inter-Mountain Reporter B. Johnson.

Councilman R. A. Woolwine was absent; C.C. Lowther arrived at 7:32 p.m.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Kelly Monk, 310 Tygart Court, addressed Council regarding the Randolph County Board of Education Levy Call. The BOE budget is approximately \$45 million annually, several times larger than the City and County budgets. Approximately one-fifth of the BOE budget is generated from real property taxes. Mrs. Monk is concerned that the levy proposes a percentage increase, not a fixed amount, and that there is no cap. She believes the levy will negatively affect the county by taking money away from taxpaying citizens and government. Mrs. Monk also has a concern about installing turf on fields where existing drainage problems exist.

Rhett Dusenbury, 140 Easy St., speaking on behalf of himself and Congressman Mooney, is aware of problems in other counties with not being able to keep law enforcement vehicles on the road. He asks Council to consider donating any vehicles they may be getting rid of to these counties.

Richard Holland, business owner, offered praise to the Fire and Police Departments for their hard work. He believes we need more officers and would like to see downtown foot patrols. Mr. Hollands understands that the City was put “behind the eight ball” years ago in terms of pay, but would like to see us work towards having the highest paid PD in the region.

### **PRESENTATION**

Robbie Morris of the Randolph County Development Authority provided an update of the organizations activities in 2018 and a 2019 outlook. In the City of Elkins, the RCDA is currently working on the Rail Trail, the Town Square Pavilion and the Greenfield Cabinetry expansion projects. In the surrounding area, they continue to work on the Armstrong Flooring expansion and the Broadband project. In 2018, within city limits, eight-two new businesses opened. This

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was 9.22% increase from the previous year and placed Elkins eighteenth among the one-thousand fifteen municipalities in the State. Mr. Morris believes that the increased social events hosted in the City are a positive reflection of the good things happening. He sees the #1 barrier to further economic development as a shallow workforce. We have more jobs than people to fill them. Moving forward, RCDA is working with Black Diamond Realty to promote Rail Yard development; the Wood Technology Center continues to grow and is considering expansion of their shop; and partnerships with technical schools and community colleges are being considered to help with the workforce training issue. Overall, Randolph County has a very positive outlook.

Randolph County Board of Education Assistant Superintendent Debbie Schmidlen shared information with Council on the upcoming Levy Call. The BOE has received appx. \$9.6 million in SBA grants for the benefit of five county schools. The three main areas they intent to focus funds raised by the levy are the students, facilities and supporting the community with waiving of fees; donation to local libraries and other programs. The BOE is working with the local fire departments to scheduled community meetings over the next month. They invite citizens to attend as well as contact the BOE at any time with questions or concerns.
